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TOWER OF THE QUARTER – ST JAMES, CHIPPING CAMPDEN, GLOS

What does one say about this magnificent church that hasn't been said before? I remember being told many years ago by an old Campdonian about a tradesman from Birmingham who came to Campden to undertake some work at the church. He returned to Birmingham saying he'd been all round the place but couldn't find it. When told he couldn't have missed it, because it was so prominent, he exclaimed, "I thought that was the Cathedral!" Unlike many other churches, St James is all-of-a-piece, no one part jarring architecturally with any other. This church is, of course, a product of the prosperous wool era, when Campden had one of the few 'Wool Staples', a body which governed the quality and price of the wool being exported, and thus it became home to rich wool merchants. The best-known of these, William Grevel, built the superb building in the High Street that carries his name, and whose brass, the largest in Gloucestershire, lies in the chancel floor. These merchants gave generously to the church, transforming the humble Norman building into the glory we see today. Rather surprisingly, its interior is fairly plain, with clear glass in many side windows. However these and the clerestories let in plenty of light, such that details of the walls, columns and roofs can be seen easily. St James contains many treasures beyond the brasses. Principally these are the 15th.c altar hangings and the 14th.c cleric's cope on display under the tower (but both are covered to protect them from light), and Sir Baptist and Lady Hicks' tomb on the south side of the Chancel. The brass 'falcon' lectern, given by Hicks, is truly a jewel, as is the Flemish-style pulpit, another of his gifts.

Externally, the delights include the Munitment Room above the porch, access to which is via a little door near the South entrance, and on the east wall of the porch is a memorial tablet to Jonathan Hulls. Who, you might ask, is Jonathan Hulls? He was the first person to be granted a patent (in 1736) for using a steam engine to power a boat. Unfortunately, it failed when tried on the Avon at Evesham, but in recognition of his foresight, his portrait hung (and may still hang) in a stateroom of the Cunarder 'RMS Queen Mary'.

The great external gem is, of course, the tower, all 120ft of it. Unfortunately, it is something of a 'wobbler', moving perceptibly when the bells are rung. It was far worse when the bells were hung in the ancient wooden bellframe at louvre level, at which time they were a handful to ring (Oh! I remember them vividly...!), but they were rehung in 1986 in a new metal frame some 15ft or so lower in the tower to improve handling and their effect on the structure. The bells are a varied lot, being the product of four founders. There were some proposals a few years ago to augment the bells to 10, but this foundered. Perhaps this should be revived with new vigour to provide a ring appropriate to the building containing them. If a 'lesser' church in the Deanery can do it, why not the 'big' Church.....?

The Guild has a practice here on Saturday Dec 17th (7.00-8.00pm), after which the Xmas Party will be held (see Notice).

FROM THE ARCHIVES (100 YEARS AGO)

The Old FSG Minute Book records the following for the period 1st October to 31st December 1911. The entry for Oct 26th is significant, as it records Walter Large had left the District by that date. Does anyone know where he went?

Oct 2nd 1911:

A Committee Meeting was held at The Swan Hotel, Moreton-in-Marsh, to consider the Programme for the Autumn Meeting on Thursday October 26th. There were present:- Rev F W Drewe (in the Chair), Rev Spencer Jones, Messrs Case, White, Williams, Pardon, Keyte, Bird, etc. Letters were read from Canon Houghton, Rev Lloyd, & Mr H Evans regretting their inability to attend the Meeting. It was decided to follow the same plan as the previous Spring Meeting, with regard to the Competitions, and that Messrs Bird & Adams be the judges.

It was also decided to ask the Rev Spencer Jones to preach the Sermon at the Special Service. It was proposed and carried that the Tea take place at the White Horse Hotel. It was further agreed that all Subscriptions be paid in January instead of various times during the year. Mention was made of the many local towers who have not yet joined the Guild. It was decided to try & induce more to become associated with the Guild. A Vote of thanks to the Chairman for presiding closed the meeting.

Oct 26th 1911

The Fourth (Autumn) Meeting of the Guild took place at Shipston on Stour on Thursday Oct 26th 1911. The attendance was very good

notwithstanding the wet weather. Ringing Competitions took place and the following Towers took part:-

Tea took place at the White Horse Hotel. A Special Service was held at the Parish Church - the Rev Spencer Jones Rector of Moreton being the preacher. At the meeting after tea it was proposed & carried that all subscriptions be paid in January for the ensuing year. Votes of thanks were passed to the Chairman & officers of the Guild; Mr F A Case was elected Secretary in place of Mr Large (who has left the District), & Mr H Jannett was elected Treasurer in place of Mr Case. Touches were rung on the bells in the evening.

GUILD MASTER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2010 – 2011 (Item 4 of AGM Agenda)

I am pleased to report that your Guild in the past year has been very active again, and your committee, elected at the last Annual General Meeting, has been working very hard on your behalf. The Guild Treasurer will also make his report at this AGM

The weekly practices have generally been well attended. The Ringing Master has either run them or someone has deputised on her behalf I have reason to believe that any tower at which we have rung during the year is happy the Guild returns.

A Guild peal was rung to celebrate the marriage at Westminster Abbey of HRH Prince William of Wales and Miss Catherine Middleton, the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge, on 2nd May at Moreton in Marsh. With the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next year in mind, let's hope the Guild can ring as many peals and quarters peals for this event in the churches in our operational area.

Another successful Annual Dinner was held on Saturday 5th February at The White Hart Royal Hotel, Moreton in Marsh, and I am sure all who attended enjoyed it. Our thanks go to Jackie Roberts, Chairman of The Ringing World, who was our guest speaker at the Dinner. The same venue has been booked for the 2012 Dinner, which will be held on Saturday 4th February.

The Committee again agreed to insuring the trophies and this was added to the existing Public Liability cover with the Ecclesiastical Insurance Group.

To resolve the confusion over the unintended false touch that occurred in the 2010 Newing Shield Striking Competition, and the lack of direction regarding this in the Rules that were current then, the Committee, under its delegated powers in those Rules, agreed an additional rule at its meeting on June 9th. That new rule had immediate effect and has become number 10 in the list of rules. The details of this rule were published in the Notices section of the July issue of the FSG Magazine.

The website under Roland Meyrick is also projecting an active Guild to the web world, and

the Guild Newsletter and other relevant details can now be read online. It also displays an advert for the Guild clothing.

After long deliberations at two committee meetings this year, proposals to update the existing Guild Rules (last amended 1992 and currently contained within a yellow booklet) were agreed. The need arises because of various changes that have occurred since 1992. Details of proposed changes were shown in the July FSG Newsletter. The parts that are to be superseded were shown struck through, with the proposed wording to replace it shown in blue. The reasons for each change were shown in italics*. We now require ratification of these amendments at this AGM. I shall therefore propose at the appropriate part of the agenda: "That the Four Shires Guild's Rules be amended, to reflect the changes that have taken place since they were last considered and amended in April 1992. The amendments and other changes proposed are outlined on pages 10 & 11 of the July 2011 Newsletter, no 129, a copy of which is distributed to all members."

The Guild is now affiliated to the CCCBR and the two representatives who were elected at the last AGM for a three-year period both attended the meeting held at Hereford in May this year. A summary of the minutes of that meeting was published in "The Ringing World" and an article entitled "Central Council Meeting 2011 – First Impressions" was written by Keith Murphy (one of our representatives) and published in the July Newsletter.

Chris Povey took on the job as Editor of the Guild Newsletter in October 2009 and as I said in my last report it has taken on a new dimension since then, both in editorial content and printing quality. The printing is still done "in house" via two home type printers purchased by the Guild specifically for this purpose, and a loyal band meet four times a year at Andrew Gunn's house to carry out the printing, collating and stapling. We can now do this in one day. Chris has given his notice and wishes to pass on the editorship of the

Newsletter (which could be more than one person). He has said he will impart his expertise over a period of time, so handing can be a gradual process. If anyone can help with the Newsletter please let us know as soon as possible.

An abridged report of the Guild Committee meetings within in the past 3 months are now published in the Newsletter, so that all members are notified of any important business. They can inform the Secretary of any items they want discussing at forthcoming committee meetings, or if clarification is required.

A Guild Bell Restoration Fund was set up following the vote for this at the 2010 AGM. Its Rules were published in the FSG Newsletter. An application was received for the Temple Guiting augmentation to 6 and the first offer of a grant from this Fund was made to St Mary's Temple Guiting PCC.

The Guild has not had the need to increase the subscriptions for some years. This has been made possible through prudent housekeeping and keeping the printing of the FSG Newsletter "in house", and I am sure you will be able see this from the accounts prepared and presented by Mike Rees. However, the time has come when an increase is needed, and during his report Mike will make the proposal (published in the July Newsletter) to increase the subscription to £5/annum.

Finally thanks should go all members of the committee for their commitment and hard work, and for the time they have given to attending the committee meetings held this past year. Thanks also to Wendy Mace for organising the Annual Ringing Tour Walk, and to Isobel Murphy for the work she does in co-ordinating the FSG monthly Mid-Week Tours.

FSG COMMITTEE MEETING, 1ST SEPTEMBER

The Committee met on 1st September at Ilmington. Matters discussed were:-

1) The Minutes of the June meeting were agreed with minor amendments.

2) Matters arising were:-

Intershires Striking Comp – set for 19th November at Cherington;

missing (post 1974) Minute Books – Peter Q agreed to delve further and harder into the possible places they may be;

Guild artefacts – some progress on this, with Committee members agreeing to divide up the list of towers and then inspecting each of them;

Christmas Party – although a ‘proper’ Christmas Party was deferred for this year at the last Committee meeting, an informal ‘get-together’ after one of the Saturday practices in December was thought to be a better way of marking the oncoming Festive Season. This was suggested as being after the practice at Chipping Campden on December 17th (*see Notice on p. 10*);

Guild badges: requests for these being received; need to check on stock and re-order if more required;

3) Reports: the following are highlights:-

Treasurer: report re finances;

H&S: see the item in the Newsletter about a broken arm (*see below*);

Newsletter Editor: October issue underway and 12 sides expected this time;

Mid-week (Vice-President’s) Tours co-ordinator: £140 collected in the last 3 months, which will go into the Guild Bell Restoration Fund; thanks expressed to Isobel and the Mid-week ringers;

CCCBR reps: there is to be a conference organised by the CCCBR on ‘Change Ringing for the Future’ and it will be held at Wellesbourne on November 12th; Guild members are invited to attend (*see Notice and relevant details on p. 10*).

Bell Restoration Fund: no more applications at this time; and Chris updated on the Temple Guiting augmentation project (*see Tower News, p. 11*).

3) Items for discussion:-

Striking Competition: Bill’s proposals from the last meeting were discussed. There was support for offering additional trophies or awards for individual parts of the competition, eg best rise, best fall, etc, as this would offer greater opportunities for bands to win something. Bill said he was unhappy with the almost-unanimous vote governing unintended false touches (published in Notices in the July Newsletter) and thought this should be retracted;

AGM arrangements: all ready for the 15th October at Barford. Offers of food, etc, for the tea will be welcome.

4) Any Other Business:-

Andrew Gunn said there was an initiative to have as many church bells as possible rung at 8.00am on the Opening Day of the 2012 Olympics (July 27th), but more on this will transpire soon;

Chris suggested there should be better liaison between the Guild and the North Cotswold Branch of the G&B to avoid clashes of events, such as the two ringing tours on the same day. This was agreed. Chris said he sent a July Newsletter to the Branch Chairman (Jeremy Meyrick);

Minimus Comp on September 10th: a Committee team was required. Five members volunteered.

Chris put forward a person for ex-Territorial membership: Peter Bennett of Newport, who is an ex-pat of the area.

John Nicholls seconded. Agreed.

Guild Annual Dinner: agreed to go to the White Hart, Moreton again (*see Notice p. 10*).

Next Meeting: 1st December, Ilmington.

HEALTH & SAFETY - A CAUTIONARY TALE

Whilst ringing in the last touch at a wedding one of the ringers had his glasses slip and he raised his arm and hand to push them back. Unfortunately the rope caught around his arm, which was quite severely damaged. At the A&E Department of the local hospital, his arm was found to be broken.

Bellringing is not a dangerous hobby, but it is never wise to think that accidents never happen! Many Associations/Guilds/Societies insure their members. It is not thought this accident could lead to a claim.

This information was given to me by a Guild member, who does not wish to divulge publicly the name of the person to whom the accident occurred, or where it occurred. He also wishes to remain anonymous, as this will

also help to identify the area in which it occurred. These details are of no consequence. What is significant, of course, is how such a simple action can cause such a severe injury. Bells are powerful things when swinging. I can say the incident happened fairly recently and in one of the four counties that surround us.

I note the incident was not expected to lead to a claim. Perhaps the injured person was retired and therefore did not have to rely upon working to gain an income. While this type of injury is undeniably a rare event, it is indicative of things that can happen and ‘lay you up such that – possibly - you can’t work and earn your daily bread’. Sympathetic employers are getting rarer in this current financial climate. Ed

THE 2011 MINI-MOUSE STRIKING COMPETITION

The entry for this year’s competition, held at Temple Guiting, was disappointing: two real teams and one scratch team. As this competition is supposed to be fun, one could conclude that most Guild members are averse to fun. Could it be that many members don’t realise it doesn’t include rising and falling, as in the Newing Shield competition, thereby making the whole thing easier? It may be neither of those, but something to do with ringing Minimus, and there are two possibilities here: that Minimus is difficult to ring (don’t laugh: I’ve seen ringers normally happy with Doubles and Minor have trouble with Minimus!), or something to do with a religion that forbids them to ring 4-bell methods. Some might say this latter is an affliction known as ‘ringing snobbery’, but I couldn’t possibly comment (if they want, they can ring Bristol Minimus – yes, there is such a method – and it really sorts out the grown-ups from the kids).

Whatever; can we please try to overcome any hang-ups about ringing Minimus before next year?

So, what happened at the competition? The real teams were The Committee and Moreton, the former ringing Minimus with tenor cover and the latter, in now time-honoured fashion, ringing the back 4. The scratch team blasted forward with Double Bob Minimus. John Gwynne was the judge. Although the scratch team had least faults, The Committee was declared the winner of the ‘properly-constituted’ teams. The trophy will presumably be awarded at the Annual Dinner. The Committee team comprised Andrew Gunn, Sophia L-S, Michael Haynes, Peter Kenealy and Chris Povey.

THE GUILD RINGING TOUR, SATURDAY 2ND JULY



We made such good time that we arrived at Christ Church, Bradford-on-Avon, with an hour to spare. Here we were joined by Sue Bacon, Roland Merrick and our friends from Fairford, Andrew and Joanne Roberts. The 1923 Gillett & Johnston 12cwt 8 were already up and so we went straight into Grandsire Triples. Call changes, St Simon's Triples, plain hunt Triples and Plain Bob Major were successful, but Double Norwich Court Bob Major proved beyond us.

Richard Turner joined us at the next tower, St Katherine's, Holt. The 9cwt 6 has a medieval 5th cast in about 1475 by the Bristol Foundry. The remaining bells were originally by Warners, but were recast in 1925 by Mears & Stainbank. Here we rang the usual popular 5 and 6 bell methods, but with an added variation – Dedworth.

Lunch was at The George in Lacock, the famous, picturesque village owned entirely by The National Trust.





Answers in the January 2012 Newsletter

THE ANSWER TO EL PRESIDENTE'S MIND-BENDER IN THE JULY EDITION

El Presidente writes:-

It would have been nice if a correct answer had come from other than science graduates, but nevertheless there were three gentlemen and one lady of that learned species who got it right: Michael Gray, Michael Sporton, Stella Southam and James Harris (*son of Brian Harris, who is an ex-pat 'Lad of the Vale', having grown up in, and learnt to ring at, Bretforton. Brian now lives and rings at Swindon. Ed.*)

The first thing to realise was that the position of the flagpole denoted that the field was cyclic, ie the corners are on a circle, with the flagpole at its centre. Then, if you don't remember it from school, you look up Brahmagupta's formula from your encyclopaedia, or these days the internet:-

$$A = \sqrt{(S-a)(S-b)(S-c)(S-d)}$$

where S is the semi-perimeter and a, b, c, d are the sides of the field, ie $S = \frac{1}{2}(a+b+c+d)$

$$\text{So } S = \frac{1}{2}(52+44+56+48) = 100 \text{ metres}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Therefore: } A &= \sqrt{(100-52)(100-44)(100-56)(100-48)} \\ &= \sqrt{6150144} = 2479.9484 \text{ sq.metres} \end{aligned}$$

Michael Gray has done some interesting conversions. A = nearly 0.25 Hectares, which is 0.613 acres or 2966 sq. yards. In view of the fact that Michael also sent a proof of the formula and he was first anyway, I have decided that he should win the prize.

For further interest the distance from the flagpole to the corners (r) can be found by:

$$\begin{aligned} r &= \frac{(ab+cd)(ac+bd)(ad+bc)}{4A} \\ &= 35.497 \text{ metres} \end{aligned}$$

(and a great deal of hard work!)

RECENT MID-WEEK MONTHLY TOURS REPORT

The Thursday outings continue to be enjoyable and well attended.

The July Outing, organised by Geoff Pratt, kept us in South Warwickshire. The first tower was All Saints, Sherbourne (6, 11cwt), after which we went to the light six (4cwt) at St Peter's, Barford, where the 3rd is one of the oldest bells in the country still being rung full circle (by the Gloucester Foundry, about 1330). Lunch was taken at The King's Head, Wellesbourne, and on its conclusion we rang on the 8 bells (10cwt) at St Peter's there. We ended a pleasant day's ringing at St Peter's, Snitterfield (6, 16cwt).

Ian Thompson organised the August Outing, which again found us in South Warwickshire. Our first stop in the morning was All Saints, Harbury (8,

12cwt), which was followed by St Gregory, Offchurch (6, 14cwt) where two of the bells are by Robert Hendley and dated about 1500. As if to copy the July Outing, we had lunch at The King's Head, but this time at the one in Cubbington. St Mary's bells, Cubbington (6, 10cwt) were put to good use afterwards. The outing finished at St Mary's Church, Stoneleigh (6, 10cwt), where yet another ancient bell was encountered, the 3rd by John Woolley dated about 1525. Warwickshire does seem to be well endowed with ancient bells!

The September Outing, organised by Alan Marks and Brenda Dixon, took us East to just over the Northamptonshire county boundary. The first tower was All Saints, Pitsford (6,

10cwt). All Saints, Brixworth was the next stop, where some slightly heavier metal was sampled (6, 16cwt). To complete the hat-trick we had lunch at – you've guessed it! – The King's Head at Spratton. Afterwards we rang at St Andrew's Church, Spratton, where a Dutch bell (the treble) had managed to infiltrate the otherwise Taylor and Bagley bells. The concluding tower was the 8 (14cwt) at All Saints, Cottesbrooke, where the back six are all by Henry Bagley II dated 1702

Thank you all you organisers for giving us some good days ringing.

HALFORD'S OLD TREBLE

Peter Richardson, to whom I am grateful for supplying articles regularly, provides us this time with a fascinating historical piece.



This historic photo recently came to light showing Halford's treble before the Church restoration of 1994/95, when there were but three bells. According to Tilley & Walters (*Church Bells of Warwickshire: 1910*) the original treble is early fourteenth century dedicated to St John the Baptist, the second was early fifteenth century but was recast by Taylors in 1883, and the tenor, weighing 7cwt 23lbs, was recast by Henry Bagley in 1639 bearing the inscription PRAYSE THE LORD

YE PEOPLE. These bells are respectively the 4th, 5th and tenor of the present ring.

The old treble is by an unknown founder. He cast in it a small Maltese cross with diagonal bars between the arms. It is said to be the oldest bell in Warwickshire. (*Although it is dated 'c.1400' in 'Dove', Barford's 3rd at c.1330 may be older. Ed.*) The photo shows clearly the typical narrow-waisted profile of the medieval bell and the rough rim edges resulting from the rudimentary method of tuning by knocking off slivers with a hammer and chisel. The inscription reads: AGIOS IN HONORE SANCTI JOHANNIS BAPTISE SUM RENOVATA., suggesting to Tilley & Walters that it had been recast, while AGIOS is interpreted as the Greek for SANCTUS. I prefer the implication that in Baptism one is re-born a Christian. Is there a Medieval Latin scholar who can shed any further light?

The massive wooden beam shown in the photo is preserved in situ and the bell's old wheel is on display in the tower arch. The Church was dedicated to 'Our Blessed Lady' in 1150AD and originally had a squat Norman tower, but during the reign of Charles I before the Civil War it was encased and heightened with an extra storey, windows, battlements and pinnacles, which allowed the treble to be hung above the larger bells and its sound therefore to carry further.

In 1995 the tower was strengthened and the three bells were retuned by Taylors and rehung in a new steel frame lower down. They were augmented at that time by two redundant Tudor bells from Little Packington. A further augmentation in 2000 by the addition of a new 2cwt Millennium treble completed the ground-floor ring to six.

Thank you, Peter. I see 'Dove' shows the ex-Little Packington bells and the old treble (the present 4th) are all listed by the CBC. It is strange that the tenor, an early bell by Henry Bagley I, the patriarch of the famous Bagley bellfounding dynasty who started founding in about 1630, isn't so.

What an outstanding photo! Bells are notoriously difficult to photograph, as wide-angle lenses are normally necessary in belfries due to the restricted space. These lenses can very easily change the proportions of a bell, making them look odd. However, this photo seems not to have changed the proportions, as the narrow waist of the bell is clearly evident. Black & white is such a delight sometimes. Ed

"OH HAPPY BAND OF PILGRIMS....." – THE GUILD WALKING TOUR

This year's outing, on Saturday 1st October, started at St Peter's Church, Willersey. Thank you to Peter McFadzeen for opening the tower for us and joining in the ringing. After the obligatory photocall we returned to the village hall to grab a quick cuppa at the RAFA coffee morning – how kind of them to cater for us! We then walked the very pleasant 2 miles or so into Broadway.



By now it was getting very warm and to beat the crowds we stopped off at The Crown and Trumpet, conveniently located en route to our next church, and sat outside to enjoy a cool drink and a pub lunch.

Then it was on to St Eadburgha's, the old church of Broadway, beautifully located in a timeless setting and just decorated for the Harvest Festival taking place the following day. old road up the hill.


I feel there might be a bigger story to the incident than shown here. The headstone itself must have cost a small fortune.

The inscription reads:-

In Memory of
John Hale of this Parish Blaksmith
Who Deceased Septemb ye 9TH 1692
Aged 25Yrs 4 Months.

Loe here's (Interr'd) the Muses Passive Friend;
Their Noblest Science (Ringing) was his End.
His Actions Just, A Martyr of that Skill,
Crush't by A Bell twas Heaven's Sacred Will.
Melodious Bells delighting him on Earth,
Exchang'd Terrestrial for Celestial Mirth:
This fatal Stroke (in haste) did stop his Breath,
Lamented was his unexpected Death.



Bells can be nasty, heavy lumps of metal if treated incorrectly, and are very capable of killing or maiming. There have been a few instances of bells killing people. There was one very recently at Christchurch Priory in Hants, where a bell badly injured a ringer who was working on an upturned bell which, through poor communication to the ringer below, came round onto him. It is coincidental this issue carries a report of a ringer's arm being broken when caught by the rope. The energy contained in a moving bell is huge. Never underestimate what damage they can do. Ed - and the H&S Officer.
