

Saturday practices and Tag End



Founded Oct 18th 1909



I started my run as Newsletter editor in 2009 (Newsletter no 122) with a map of the FSG area on the front page. But as time was short, I'd drawn it quickly to get something to use and there were some omissions (apologies were made to Quinton and Welford in No 123!). As I've come to the end of my editing era with this issue, No 161, I thought a map as at 2019 would be appropriate. In those 10 years there have been some rehangings, eg Wyck Rissington: some rehangings and/or augmentations, eg, Adlestrop, Blockley, Stanway and Temple Guiting; and some additional towers, eg Little Comberton, and Pillerton Hersey (the latter rehung and augmented). Also during that time the Bells Restoration Fund has been formed and a total amount of £6,270 spread over 19 grants has been offered and used by the towers concerned. While some of these grants have been used for major rehanging work, many have been used to keep rings from unringability, which is even more satisfying. Yes, Great Rollright, Evenlode and Honeybourne are still requiring substantial work, the first two very substantial work, but time sometimes brings surprising solutions, eg Saintbury back in the 1980s.. THE CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHTS

Angela and I went to France for the opening of the new ring of bells at St. George's Church, Vernet-les-Bains in the Pyrenees, which was to be on Easter Day for the Parish Communion Service. On our way to dinner in the Princess Hotel we saw on the television that a huge Church was on fire. That Church was Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris. After dinner we looked at the television in our bedroom and it was the first time that I have watched a tower falling into the central part of the Cathedral. One of the two familiar towers at the west end was also beginning to burn, but that fire was controlled, and it said that the bells were largely unaffected.

The Archbishops and Bishops in France and England asked that all bells be rung on Maunday Thursday when few bells are normally rung in Holy Week. Those ringers, like us, who arrived early rang a quarter peal of Plain Bob Caters in 48 minutes, this being the first on the new ring (tenor 5-0-15). There were many more ringers by Easter Day, when we all rang before and after the Church Service, at which 78 were present. There is a British Chaplain (Diocese of Europe).

Some years ago I went to Kilmallock in the Diocese of Limerick as a locum for the Rector who had gone on a family visit to Canada. Angela and I were due to stay in the Rectory, but a few days before we arrived workmen were replacing lead on some of the flat roofs and there was a fire in the night and much of the roof was destroyed. It was arranged that we stay with a local family in the village. The Dean of Limerick invited me to preach at Evensong and this is the only time that I have been invited to do so in a Cathedral.

Many things can be damaged or destroyed by fire, such as churches, shops, homes and other buildings. Also woods, farms and the like, and even whole forests.

The love of God for all his people cannot be destroyed by fire, so let us ring our bells whether in Cathedrals, parish Churches or even secular rings. Let our bells proclaim the Christian faith, because the music of the bells, well rung, has over the centuries brought many people closer to the love of God.

ALFRED GEORGE FRANK SPIERS MBE 1925-2019

Frank was born in January 1925 the second child of Alfred and Victoria Spiers who kept the Bull's Head in Bidford on Avon, Warwickshire. His younger brother, Fred, in due course took over the tenancy from his mother. The tenancy had passed to his mother on the death of his father when Frank was 9 years old. Frank could often be seen behind the bar helping his brother and this became the watering hole of the ringers.

From a very early age Frank was a boy chorister at St Laurence Church just over the road from home. He never moved far from his beloved Church. At the age of about 12 Frank was invited into the tower by the then captain, Arthur Shorey.

After schooling in the Village Frank, at the age of 14, started work at the BSA factory in Redditch later moving to the Austin Motor Company at Longbridge finally working on car bodies as a sheet metal worker. He initially cycled the 12 miles to Redditch before moving to a motor cycle which he subsequently added a side car. In the 1950s this was exchanged for a car. After being demobbed Frank returned to The Austin and remained there until retirement.

At the age of 18, when called up for military service, he decided to join the Grenadier Guards and after training served time in Germany finally returning to Caterham where he was a Drill Instructor until he was demobbed. He was very proud of his time in the Grenadier Guards, a member of the local branch of the Grenadier Guards Association and almost always wearing his Guards tie. No surprise our sallies are the colours of the Grenadier Guards! Prior to Military Service, Frank was an amateur boxer something which he was able to continue with whilst serving with the Guards, representing them in various competitions.

In 1953 Frank married Gian a marriage which was to last until 2002 when Gian died. They had two children, Jill and John. Frank was very proud of his children and their achievements.

In 1995 Frank was awarded the MBE for "services to Bidford on Avon". Locally Frank was known as Mr Bidford, a tribute to all the village organisations to which he was involved. He was a Parish Councillor for 45 years, a Churchwarden and a member of the Royal British Legion. Perhaps I should add here that Frank enjoyed his football as a youngster playing for the local team and later as a referee travelling to various games in the area. He was also involved in raising funds for the village cricket pavilion. Sport would often be a topic of conversation with fellow ringers. Space does not allow me to list all his activities during his lifetime.

Returning now to Frank's ringing and looking at Tower records it appears that Frank's first quarter peal was in 1955. Ringing at Bidford was rejuvenated in the 1970s when Frank asked Michael Homans how to teach new ringers. This was the start of the new band. In the 1980s Fred and Joan Munday, Pam Craney, myself and my husband Richard all moved into the village. This was really the moment when Frank was able to progress and enjoy his ringing. In the period to 2006, which was his last quarter peal, he rang a minimum of 58 quarter peals and conducted one of Plain Bob Doubles. On Bidford bells Frank would normally be ringing the 7th or the Tenor. Frank was not a peal ringer but did ring 9 peals with Peter Border and Chris Mew conducting them.

Whilst Frank did not take office he was a member for over 50 years of both the W&DCRA and the Coventry Guild of Bellringers, also joining the Four Shires Guild and would always try and attend meetings. He enjoyed the monthly outings with the FSG and in the early years he would have a day out with Gian sorting out the lunchtime pub. At the May outing Grandsire Doubles was rung as attribute to him, a method which he would ring on these days out and would sometimes call. He would often comment that ringing took him to 'some lovely parts part of the country'. He was elected an Honorary Life Member of the Guild at the 2018 AGM.

In late April 2019 Frank was taken to hospital and subsequently discharged to the care home home in Bidford, where he had been for just over a year, where he died peacefully on 7^{th} May.

The congregation of 240, for his funeral, shows the regard and affection with which Frank was held. There was half muffled ringing prior to the Service with the local band ringing Frank out of Church. Whilst the burial was taking place in the Churchyard next to the Church a quarter peal was rung, the details of which are:-

Rung immediately after the funeral service of A G Frank Spiers MBE (1925-2019). Frank was born in Bidford and it was his home for his whole life. He was fully involved in village life throughout his life including playing and refereeing football, working on the parish council and being fully involved as a parishioner at this church. He learnt to ring in 1939 and was tower captain for many years, only giving up ringing when not well enough to do so. He was awarded the MBE in 1995 for services to Bidford. 400th quarter - 3. **Sandra Parker**

'A RECEPTION IN HONOR OF RINGERS'

No, I haven't misspelt honor, as that's exactly the spelling used when I received an email early on Monday, April 29th. Topped with an official crest it read:-

The Ambassador of the United States of

America

Robert Wood Johnson

requests the company of

Mr. Chris Povey

at a reception in honor of Bell Ringers

I looked at it and looked again. I called Helen to find out what she made of it. We both thought it was probably a spoof or a late April Fool. What in Heaven's name had Ambassador Johnson to do with English-style ringers, or more to the point, with me? The story behind this came out a little later - the email was genuine. It seems Ambassador Johnson was visiting St Paul's Cathedral when the bells were being rung. He asked if could go to watch and was taken up the tower. He was fascinated and resolved put on a reception for ringers at his official residence, Winfield House, in Regent's Park on Thursday May 9th. He liaised with Christopher O'Mahoney, the President of the CCCBR, on invitations. Whether I received one as Secretary of the Guild or from the past work I've done with the CCCBR. I don't know. But here it was.

It's a bit difficult refusing such a high-level invitation, so I thought I'd better go and duly RSVP'd my intention to be there. Apparently there were only 120 invitations, so I felt quite honoured.

I went up by train and tube, and walked the last quartermile to Winfield House. I was a little early, but there was already a small gathering outside the tall metal gates. But who were these people? They were all suited and booted – literally – so how could they be ringers? But they were. More arrived, equally suited and booted (the dress code did say 'smart).

Eventually the gates opened and we lined up to show our passports or similar to prove identity. Two armed policemen were standing inside the gates. This was no ordinary meeting of ringers! Once inside Winfield House the atmosphere changed. It was very easy-going, although nicely formal – but to see ringers in their Sunday-best (in most cases better than their Sunday-best) was quite surreal. I doubt whether I shall ever see such again. Drinks and nibbles were offered. I had a particularly enjoyable 'whisky on the rocks', as I wasn't driving home! We were allowed to visit the various rooms there and move into the garden. It's a very fine house, but I guess security is drum tight – and certainly would have been later when the President came to stay there during his visit to the UK.

A little later Ambassador Johnson came down to see us and gave an extremely good talk, after which there was a glorious touch of Stedman Cinques on handbells. Mingling followed that and then our time was up, so we gradually exited the building. It was an experience that will be talked about for some time – and for it showing that ringers can dress very smartly indeed.

A.J.Brazier, in the absence of the Guild Master, proposed a vote of thanks to Miss Bedford for her work as treasurer over the past two years. Treasurer's Report:

The Treasurer and Guild Master had sorted it out and believe the Guild to be in credit. We started the day at Saintbury (8) on a wet misty morning, the famed view over the vale denied us. Never mind, some useful ringing on the 8 with tea & coffee available being provided

Next stop the nearby tower of Broadway (6) enticed some visitors in to watch. Some ringers find these bells - the heaviest of the day - a challenge, with their long ropes and high rope quide, but most people managed them well. (cont next page)

On to Buckland another delightful 6 in yet another picture postcard setting. Quite acceptable ringing here and they were enjoyed.

Lunch was taken at the Gardeners Arms at Alderton; then on to ring at Toddington (6), a solid and magnificent Victorian church, with a tower and spire to match. It was a good climb to the ringing chamber. Our staple repertoire of Plain Bob, Grandsire and even Stedman was attempted.

Didbrook (5; and the lightest ring of the day) proved challenging to say the least. Rung from near the west door, 'ring' is a bit much: the 4

trebles are in line one side of the walkway through, and the tenor the other side. Very flighty indeed; I consider myself lucky not to have broken a stay!

The last of our towers was at Stanton (6), another 'chocolate-box top' church in a 'chocolate-box top' village. These had the added quirk of having the ropes arranged anticlockwise, so some confusion not unnaturally arose to start with. But eventually we triumphed!

Our aim to keep it simple and keep it local proved a popular choice and we hope to repeat it next year. This was the first tour for some and the variety of towers and bells improved all our skills, from flighty bells to long draughts to anti-clockwise, we had it all.

With thanks to the 'professionals' who kept us right, Chris, Roger, Martin and Richard.

TALES FROM A TOWER NEAR YOU (19)

In contrast to previous bell handling tales this time we look at the traditional method employed for a small bell. 10 years ago in 2009 the two bells at **Stanley Pontlage** nr Winchcombe were refurbished in conjunction with the then necessary repair to the open turret stonework which housed them.

Only 18 inches or so in diameter the two similarly uninscribed bells complete with their elm headstocks were quickly despatched to ground level using a vintage 1ton chain operated pulley block once they had been released from the plain bearing mountings fixed in the stonework – the condition of the stonework was best described as 'completely shot'. The swinging of the bells, using a rope attached to an iron lever on the headstock, was an alarming sight. (My accompanying photographs recorded the scene) **Roger de 'Flaedenburg'**


