The Guild Magazine it is now distributed and read online but if anyone does want a paper copy they can request it.

People may have read a number of times that Chris Povey is tendering his resignation at the AGM we must thank him for all the work he has done during his time in that office.

Alison Lee is the new editor of "The Four Shires Magazine" and our thanks must go to her for producing such an excellent product after taking over from Chris Povey, the magazine has taken on a new dimension, in editorial content. The printing is still completed "in house" on home printers by a few loyal members producing a good quality magazine, this of course keeps our cost down significantly, but during the pandemic the magazine has been distributed online.

We were of course very sorry to have to cancel the 2021 Annual Dinner also the 2022 dinner has been cancelled, it is hoped the dinner will be revived in 2023 we also hope to have a Guild event during the summer of 2022 when we see things getting some way back to normal.

Published in the Magazine is always an abridged copy of the current minutes of each Guild Committee meeting so that all members are notified of any important business, and they can inform the secretary of any items they want discussed at committee meetings or need clarification.

Our Bell Restoration Fund, which was set up, in 2010 has made a number of grants during the year and these have been reported in the magazine. The Committee are empowered to offer grants towards any suitable projects concerning rings of bells within the Guild's area of operation, if you have a project where a grant from the Guild will help please do not hesitate to enquire and obtain the necessary application forms.

To continue giving grants to worthy applications we must increase our funding other-wise our grants will be too small to make a useful contribution to a project, ways of doing this are being considered by the committee, we are also looking at the ways other Guilds operate their funding schemes, in the meantime thanks go to all members who have made extra donations to the fund this has made a real difference.

Bell Fund Appeal

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD TUESDAY 10TH AUGUST 2021 IN PERSON AT CHURCH HOUSE, EVESHAM (THE FIRST IN-PERSON MEETING SINCE 18TH FEB 2020)

1 Apologies for absence: Christina, John W, John C.

The Newsletter Editor, Alison Lee, joined the meeting to discuss the 'Learning to ring' flyer.

2 Minutes of the Meeting held on Tuesday 11th May by email submission

The Minutes were agreed and signed as such. Minutes of the meetings held in May, Aug and Nov 2020, and in Feb 2021, which had been agreed by email, were signed by the Master to formally confirm them.

3 Matters arising from the Minutes

Reports

4.1 Secretary: this mainly concerned updates from the lockdown period:-

a) the Principal Officers made some decisions where speed was required: essentially grant matters;

b) a letter from the CCCBR President asked for views on reducing the number of CC reps. This was sent to all for comment. There were two responses, both in agreement. Guild response was this;

- c) death of Robert Hall (Guild Independent Examiner) on 11th May reported at the time, but reported here formally. An Obituary was published in the July Newsletter.
- 4.2 **Treasurer**: Michael provided a note re finances prior to the meeting. As of 06/08/2021 the General Fund contains £1,252.25 (although there will be a cost of printing the 'Learn to ring' flyers: see later; and printing of Newsletters as previously will restart).

4.3 Other: none

5 Bells Repair Fund

Finance: Michael reported grants to Honington and Moreton-in-Marsh have recently been paid (see below), plus allocated funds to Childswickham, Didbrook, Halford and Aston Cantlow are awaiting completion or inspection prior to payment. The unallocated total at 06/08/2021 was £4,689.30..

Update on grants:

Moreton-in-Marsh clock move: complete and grant paid

Aston Cantlow: work complete and grant to be paid

Didbrook: fundraising on-going, but additional funds for tower repairs have been required. An extension to the time limit has been requested, which was agreed. Work to start in November

Halford: work complete, but a reduction was made to cover a reduction in work content (ropes)

Honington: work complete and grant paid

Childswickham: payment of remainder of grant to cover recent arrival of set of new ropes

6 'Learning to ring' flyer

This is a venture master-minded by Alison Lee (Newsletter Editor). The Committee supported it, generally and financially. Some minor amendments were agreed. The Guild is willing to cover the cost of printing. The weight of paper to be 100gm/m2. The intention is to target particular locations initially. Alison to 'sign-off' the final version after amendments. Michael to investigate printing costs, and if 'reasonable' to go ahead with printing: 3000 was suggested. (Action: all re final amendments/Alison/MD)

7 AGM, 16th October Wellesbourne: includes Striking Comps.

This is a change of venue, but the July Newsletter carried to change details Peter reported that the location, Vicar and organist are all OK. Meeting to be in the church There are a number of elections this time, including Hon Sec (Chris is resigning the post) Master's Report required: to go in the October Newsletter (Action: Peter)

8 Assessment of current membership

Chris said we need to check who is still a member after the lockdown, as some have let their membership lapse, some have given up, or sadly have been lost through death.

9 Subscriptions: to increase or stay the same

Agreed to stay the same, although the cost of posting a Newsletter should rise to £4

10 Resumption of Guild activities.

Saturday practices: some were still hesitant about doing this. Agreed to have Saturday practices in GF towers on a one-per-month
basis to start with: to start November.Stuart said he was still cautious about covid and would prefer not to arrange towers until
later on. Peter and Michael agreed to arrange a tower for one Saturday in November and similar in December(Action:
Peter and Michael)

Stuart said he was happy if somebody else wished to undertake the Saturday night arranging, as he had done this for 10 years now. Xmas Party: Not this year.

Guild Dinner: yes, but to be wary of changes in covid restrictions (Action: Peter)

Is there a Plan B if nobody takes on the Hon Sec role? Unknown... (Nobody has come forward so far) Chris suggested that an open invitation to attend these meetings should be extended to Alison as Newsletter Editor. This was

FOUR SHIRES GUILD

From the archives 100 years ago

October 26th 1921, The half yearly meeting of the guild was held at Moreton on Wednesday Oct 26th. The proceedings commenced at 2pm, when Ilmington opened the competition, followed by, Campden, Shipston and Blockley. Willersey having written to say that owing to the pinnacles of this tower being unsafe they were quite out of practice, and so were unable to take part in this meeting.

At 4:30 a special service was held in the church of St Davids, the preacher being the Rev G.E.Hitchcock, vicar of Campden. After the service the members adjourned to "The Rectory" where a splendid tea had been provided by Mrs Spencer Jones, and ably assisted at the tables by Mrs Richard Timms and other ladies.

At the business meeting the vicar of Campden was elected chairman. After the minutes had been duly read and passed, the chair-

man, read letters of apology for absence from the President, (Sir G.A.H.Wills). The Rev Spencer Jones, and Mr E.Harris, (Willersey). The judge (Mr E. Pardon) was then requested to disclose the results of the competitions which he gave as follows,

The average for the whole being 210, which number was allotted to Moreton as the non competitive tower. The totals for the two half-yearly competitions was as follows; Shipston, 531. Campden, 504, Moreton, 457. Illmington, 330. Blockley, 314.

Shipston being the highest was then presented with the shield, to be held for the next 12 months. It was agreed to present certificates to Campden and Illmington as winners of call changes and rising & falling respectively.

The question of obtaining badges to be worn by members was left in the hands of the secretary. It was proposed by Mr C.Bird, seconded by Mr W.Harris that the spring meeting be held at Illmington, carried. Mr Richard Timms (Churchwarden) and the Rev W.L.Warne, who had accepted invitations to tea, both spoke of the pleasure they had derived from being present on this occasion, and they also rejoiced to see the good feeling shown, as everything had passed off very happily. Votes of thanks were proposed by the vicar of Campden to the Lady helpers at the tea, and to the Rev and Mrs Spencer Jones for the use of the room, and by the secretary to all those friends who had contributed in money or in kind towards the tea, these were duly seconded & carried with acclaimation. This concluded another successful meeting.

FROM THE ARCHIVES: 40 YEARS AGO

Minutes of a Committee meeting held at 3 Queens Road Shipston-on-Stour at 8.00pm 20 October 1981

1 Minutes of the last meeting were read out, and signed by the Guild Master

2 Matters arising

Open afternoon: it was reported although only a few people attended some ringing was done and those who came enjoyed themselves. Mr Brazier suggested early advertising (up to 2 months in advance) is important to improve attendance. Mr Fairfax said the late press reporting of the event was very poor;

Outing: Mr Fairfax noted ringers tailed off towards the end of the day. Mr Brazier suggested one less tower be attempted next year

Todenham: the report in the Newsletter was noted;

AGM: date altered to 31st October. Offenham Village Hall would be available at a nominal fee;

Broadwell tower: the Secretary reported this tower would not be available for the 4th quarter of 1981. Discussion ensued. 3 Competition

Mr Fairfax reported

Mr Fairfax reported arrangements were in hand but were still short of teams. He expressed concern for the future viability of the competitions. There was discussion on the number of towers capable of offering a team. These were Mickleton, Offenham, Ebrington, Campden, Willersey, Blockley, Moreton, Childswickham. Mr Turner suggested if a tower could not raise enough ringers it should combine with another tower, eg Todenham and Shipston.

4 AGM

Mr Harmer was nominated as Secretary - prop J Nicholls, sec AJ Brazier;

Miss J Taylor was nominated as Ringing Master - prop AJ Brazier, sec MF Fairfax

Committed decided to recommend subscriptions increase to ± 1.00

5 Guild Activities

Mr Fairfax re-read the six points he made in his last report. It was noted no comments had been received;

Mr Brazier suggested practices be restricted to the centre of the Guild area. Mr Turner pointed out restricting the area would restrict members. Mr Fairfax suggested statistics be compiled of members attending each practice and particularly of local ringers present.

6 Annual Dinner

Mr Fairfax agreed to make enquiries about an alternative venue

7 Next meeting: AGM at Offenham.

Thanks were offered to Mr Turner for the use of his home.

Learning Methods - 'LOGOF'!

We are probably all familiar with the acronym 'BOGOF' - Buy One, Get One Free - it is a favourite which all the supermarkets regularly use to tempt us to spend. Amazingly, in ringing, we have a similar option, because it turns out that if you learn a method properly and know the starts for each place bell as well as knowing where you pass the treble.... and what follows, we can mix and match the snippets we create to effectively learn one method and then get not just one, but lots more..... absolutely free.

The key to this is splitting the line above and below the treble...


Above and a Below?

If you have learnt where you pass the treble, hopefully you will know what comes next... whether you are on the way up to the back or down to the front it can give you an indication as to where you are on a line. This has been a key element in everything we have looked at so far, from Plain Bob upwards and on any number of bells... It is always paramount that you know where you will pass the treble on the line, particularly if you intend ringing longer lengths, because it will allow you to re-affirm your position quickly and easily when your concentration is broken or something happens to distract you.... bi ti your mistake, someone else's mistake, you are concentrating on striking or something extraneous happens.... and of course, **No one can concentrate continuously for more a matter of minutes without a momentary lapse**.

Passing the Treble in Plain Bob Doubles


Let's just remind ourselves of something very simple... We all know the work in Plain Bob Doubles and for most, we will also ring by the treble.... We know that seconds place bell will pass the treble last (it is the bell before you lead at the start... and also the last when you hunt to the back). It will then move one place earlier after each dodge...

In the diagram we can see the circle of work with the leads, place bells and the treble passing places all colour coded - Red when you are going up and blue when coming down.... These are also marked in the same way on the line.



If we now look at a selection of common doubles methods, we can see commonality between them....

Below Work




All these methods share the same **below** work...

The blue sections of the line are all the same, although All Saints and St Augustine's use those elements in a different order.

Because the above work is different, there are 5 different place bell orders.

These are not the only methods which share Plain Bob below the treble... I found at least 4 others without looking too hard, so there are probably several more!

Above Work



If you look carefully at these five methods, you will see that they all use the same **above work.** The same 4 red snippets of line appear, although not necessarily in the same order.

All except Plain Bob have a similar coursing order, and realistically the other 4 are very similar....just what happens in the 8 front work blows separates them.

These are the five 'standard' below works which can go with PB above..... there are at least 10 others, but, like Grandsire, they use bells which are not part of the main working pattern, so are a slightly different proposition, as they generally require more than just 'Bobs' to switch things around.

The Implications...

It probably does not take a rocket scientist to realise that if we have 5 below works and 6 different above works, we could combine them in different ways to make more methods... Actually, not all combinations work, but you will still get lots that do ...and we have only scratched the surface! St Simon's is often a common next step from Plain Bob... so then moving on to St Martin's, St Osmund's or Eynesbury is a simple and straightforward follow on. Learn Reverse Canterbury and you can then combine these four 'below works' to create St Nicholas, Winchendon Place, St Remigius and Huntley Place Learn Shipway's Place and you then get Westminster 2, Blackburn Place, St Hillary's and Strelley Place. Learn Wainfleet and you get Maltby, Chevasse Place, Callender and Merionethshire.... Each time an investment of learning no more than 20 changes (the 4 'above' snippets of line) and you get 5 more methods to add to the portfolio! You can even add above works which do not work with Plain Bob below - and get even more methods.... These 'above' examples all use the same St Simon's 'below' work... but New and Twineham have no straightforward Plain Bob relative.

It should now be becoming obvious how the 'advanced' bands manage to ring so many different methods in their peals and quarters... Realistically, for them it is probably more of an issue remembering the method names than the lines they label!

The learning investment for doubles is relatively small...just a few changes for each snippet, so next time, we will take this idea and see how it can be used with the more complex lines found in surprise....and with the long and complex lines and patterns they contain- the benefits will be so much more rewarding!

I couldn't agree more with Simon Adams from Taylors of Loughborough, who has previously stated to me that Stratford's bells are some of the best in the country, both to ring and to listen to. Being accompanied by their glorious sound, in a QP of Grandsire Caters expertly called by the Guild's very own Richard Lewis-Skeath, was a delight.

It is fair to say that some were nervous of ringing a QP for the first time in rather a while and others of ringing Grandsire. They needn't have worried because their ringing was beautiful. Doug Bates, former Tower Captain at Stratford, provided reassurance by stating that the bells were weaned on Grandsire from their installation in 1948, so much so that they could almost ring it themselves. And, of course, I couldn't resist having a ring, for a quick session of rounds and

call changes after the service, having stress-tested potential wedding dresses for their ability to cope with my arms outstretched above my head. After the QP, the band were treated to a passage to the reception by punt. Some were too nervous of small boats on water to take advantage of it, but those who did rang handbells for us, just rounds and call changes as they travelled, punted by, you guessed it, a friend of ours. Tim and I used the same punt and friend to leave our reception.

A special shout-out should go to RL-S and to Steve Bowley, who not only rang but also sang in our home-made choir of family and friends. The choir of twelve sang two unaccompanied choral anthems. They brought tears of joy to my eyes when we first heard their singing and they have done so every time since that I've heard it. Most of the choir didn't



know one another, and none knew their conductor (also a friend). They met for the first time the afternoon before the service for an

hour or so, then for an additional few minutes on the morning of the service. Accolades came in thick and fast, from as soon as we were processing out of church, right through to the end of the month, when I'm writing this. One guest stated to me last night that she knew that the choir from Holy Trinity must be good, but she never thought that they'd be that good. She was amazed when I told her that they weren't the home choir and that they'd not previously met until the afternoon before. So, well done and thank you to the Guild's Steve (tenor) and. It's likely very few Guild members know that one of our Vice-Presidents is a long-term donor of bells to bell projects. It has been said he was the forerunner of the Keltek Trust. Realisation of this record of donations came recently when an exhibition of bells, bell hanging and bell ringing was being assembled at St Michael & AA's Church at Ledbury, where the bells have been overhauled and two trebles added to make 10. The person is question gave the new 2nd bell. So, who is this very remarkable and generous donor? It's Rev Dr Peter Newing.

For the Ledbury exhibition Peter was asked how many bells he had donated, which caused him to have a count up. The answer was 7 new-cast bells (including Ledbury's 2nd) and over 30 second-hand bells. It seems, too, that Peter has been at this game for a very long time. He has even contributed internationally, as the 6th bell of the new light ring of 10 at Vernet-les-Bains in France (the first and only English-style ring in that country) was given jointly by him and Angela. This, clearly, is an unusually large tally of usable bell metal and an enormous contribution to our Art.

There are two (to my knowledge) examples of Peter's generosity in the Guild's area: the treble at Temple Guiting to augment to 6, and the new-cast treble at Blockley to assist in augmenting to 10.

Peter told me a story of one venture to collect a 10cwt bell. At the time he had an old Morris Minor pickup, with a rated maximum load of 7cwt. He chanced the extra weight, which put the back end down on the springs with little movement to the bump stops. He'd come many miles to collect this bell and therefore faced a long journey home, but hoped for luck (or possibly in his case Divine assistance) to allow such to happen without incident. He went off carefully in the Morris Minor, mainly in deference to the rear springs, which hit the bump stops fairly regularly. To overcome this, Peter thought a trip up the motorway would be smoother, which it was; and it would ease the journey time, too. However, the motorway introduced a new problem: no steering! The little Morris had just about sufficient adhesion on the front tyres to give barely adequate steerage at 50mph on normal roads, but at 60mph on the motorway the front end started to lift and there was virtually nothing. The combination of little or no control, probably inadequate brakes (no fancy disc brakes on Morris Minors...) and a half-ton lump of bronze sitting just behind ready to shoot forward in an accident, caused 'a certain amount of anxiety' – and a maximum of 50mph for the rest of the motorway journey. He did manage to arrive home safely with everything intact.

The installation of Temple Guiting's 'new' treble, and Peter's contribution to this scheme, was covered in Newsletter 131 (January 2012).
