**Proposals for membership** none

<u>Guild Insurance</u> It was decided to wait for the next quote to reassess any insurance cover for the Guild's valuables and activities. A rise of 5% (c. £420.00) would be within an acceptable rise should there be any. The committee's general view was that EIG had been good value for money and probably the most suitable type of insurance for the guild's valuables and activities.

Hon. Treasurer/Membership Clothing costs had risen on some items, the main reason being a rise in postage and packing.

Ringing master The first Guild practice since covid restrictions kicked off to a good start with monthly practices `starting at Ilmington - 18 people attended.

**Safeguarding** No incidents reported. The secretary made a suggestion about promoting the new safeguarding Leadership procedures.

Website Richard asked if website calendar could be updated

CCCBR update Donation/grant to the central council's new mobile belfry was discussed. Some members had voiced their opposition to any donation to this on the grounds that grants should only be given to towers within the Guild's sphere. After some time of deliberation, it was decided the Guild should give a grant of £280. This was on the firm understanding that this project deserved special consideration as a national scheme.

Peal Secretary no report

- 5. **Bells repair fund** unallocated funds stand at £4,845. The Didbrook grant had been extended due to Covid. Grants were also paid to Moreton and Halford.
- 6. Learning to ring flyer
- 7. **AGM report/update**. Feedback for the AGM was very positive. Guild members commented on what an enjoyable event it was. The turnout was also very good.

The committee discussed the possibility of changing the times of future AGM's. For example, whether we should start earlier and finish earlier, and with alterations to the structure of the event. There was no particular opposition to this as such, but it was decided to give the matter further airing. It was however stressed by some committee members, that any changes would have to be made through a FSG members vote at an AGM.

- 8. **Assessment of current membership** a decision was made to update the membership list in the New Year when sub payments were due.
- 9. **Resumption of Guild activities update**. While covid restrictions were still in place, ground floor rings and open balconies were suggested for future practices. Reasons for this were to optimise ringing chamber ventilation. A spring BBQ was suggested as a possible outdoor substitute for the annual dinner. Another suggested event was a return to the skittles evening.

# The Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme has been extended

It has recently been announced by the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) that the LPWG Scheme has been extended to the end of March 2025. It's a scheme that allows the VAT on eligible work to Places of Worship to be refunded. This may not be of interest initially to many ringers, but it will to those ringers trying to raise money for work to their bells. Having the VAT refunded makes a big difference to the overall bill, ie, not quite so much fundraising to do – although the VAT must be paid before it's refunded. And all the relevant receipts for the work must be to the PCC, as only the PCC that can claim the refund.

So, if you are considering work to your bells, it might be a good idea to think about doing this sooner rather than later, to be fairly confident that there will still be money in the DCMS's pot at the end of this period (it's not just bell work that's eligible). I should tell you, too, that bell ropes are included in the eligibility list (although you won't be able to claim for one or two ropes, as there's a minimum spend, but Evesham Bell Tower saved about £500 when a new set of ropes was received last year. Worth looking at what this scheme has to offer: a dollar saved is a dollar earned... PCC Treasurers should know all about this scheme, as it's been running for a few years now.

Your church must be Listed, at List 2, List 2\* or List 1. Most churches in the Guild's area are listed.

# Four Shires Guild of Bellringers -Financial Report 2021

The guild operates 2 bank accounts with HSBC; a Community Account which is our day to day account for General Funds and a Business Money Manager Account (which generates a small amount of interest) which holds the Bell Fund.

This was another difficult year with Covid restrictions continuing and no subscriptions were charged apart from those members who had not paid in 2020. The General Fund started the year with £3,522.12 (including a donation of £2000 for the Bell Fund) and finished with £761.42. Taking into account the Bell Fund donation we made a loss over the year of £760.

The income from subscriptions was £93 and there was expenditure of £356.14 on printing and postage (including printing certificates), £419.06 for the guild insurance and £80 for CCCBR. At the end of the year there was an outstanding bill of £148 for printing the flyers. The total membership for 2020/211 was 198 including 8 Life members (down on 2019 but with tower members not meeting it was not easy for many to collect the subs)

The Bell Fund started the year with £4,480.99 and ended with £5,365.59. The income was £2,528.60 from donations and advertising. We paid a number of grants: Honington (£800), Moreton (£234), Childswickham (£50), Aston Cantlow (£90), Halford (£190) and the CCCBR Mobile Belfry (£280). There is one outstanding grant of £800 to Didbrook. At the end of 2021 we had £4,565.59 of unallocated funds which can be used for grants.

# My Journey towards 50 Ringing Things

Whilst I was ringing one evening in January 2020 in my tower (Pebworth) my long suffering teacher Claire Penny suggested that I should start to work towards



achieving 50 Ringing Things.



Another ringer from my tower Alison Lee had already started hers and this was proving interesting and beneficial to her.

I was soon doing very well and achieved my Bronze fairly quickly before the end of February 2020 then Covid got in the way and all towers stopped ringing which Immediately stopped my progress to Silver. I quickly found there were quite a lot of challenges/tasks I could do on my own or achieve by studying i.e. write a method using place notation, studying the history of bell ringing and studying the history of my tower. I also did a lot of ringing online using zoom and ringing room apps this included some training which of course enabled me to progress, an extra benefit of this was that I met numerous helpful and friendly ringers that I would



I achieved my Silver award in February 2021, I was delighted but never thought I would ever achieve my Gold mainly because of the restrictions caused by covid which stopped me ringing at additional different towers.



As restrictions were eased I renewed my efforts to progress as much as possible, I found towers in my area and a few more during UK holidays and all were helpful in my progression.

I soon realised that it was going

to be difficult and that my original plan to ring at more than 50 different towers was not likely to be achievable within the target timescale, however revisiting the booklet I found alternative tasks that I could achieve. I completed my Gold/Gold plus in January 2022 which was just under 2 years from registration but just over the 100 week target, I was worried that this would disqualify me from the gold plus award but after discussion with the helpful people from ART I was delighted that they extended the timescale and therefore I achieved my target.


I was asked if there was a highlight and whilst there is no particular one that stands out, the experience of climbing up and around the bells to fit a stay and in another tower to fit muffles will always stay in my mind, not bad for a 75 year old!

An area that has helped me progress in my ringing was the experience of ringing very light bells and very heavy bells and this made me realise that your technique can be modified to suit an individual bell and overall this experience has helped me in my day to day ringing. Without a doubt there are many things within the 50 RT that I would never have done without the motivation provided by the challenge.

I would encourage any bell ringer at any stage of their ringing journey to have a go at 50 R T as I did. I am sure that any of you will find it most rewarding.

# Preparing for your first peal

I could not find much information on the net so here's my contribution to those preparing for a first peal. If I was still a teenager I wouldn't need to prepare but I'm not so I felt I had to think about this event carefully, I had one month to prepare.

I have already completed a number of quarter peals in the past and am fairly confident in the method chosen for my peal although most of that was 2 years ago pre-covid.

My main concern was how to prevent blisters on my hands as so far all infrequent quarters cause me blisters, sometimes all over my hands. I had an experienced bellringing teacher scrutinise my technique and although not much was found wrong she did suggest I was slightly over pulling and snatching to strike my bell in the right place rather than being relaxed and smooth so I set to, to try and put this right.

As I have been ringing for several years changing my technique would not be easy but not impossible, I had sessions on the simulator and during practice with people watching me specifically and correcting /giving me feedback that helped my technique greatly. Now for my hands, there were a few ideas on the bell ringing forums on what to put on the hands to toughen them up such as alcohol gel, coal, rice even urine! I decided to use hand cream to allow my skin to be as supple as possible.

I planned to increase my practice each week over the next month both physical longer lengths of ringing and mental ability to concentrate. Each week I increased my practice by one quarter length either by time on the simulator or by arranging simultaneous quarters. Week one was all about my technique, improvements continued with a vengeance, simulator practice up to 45 minutes concentrating on relaxed rhythm, no over pulling or snatching and the Mobel app at home for mental method practice.

On week two I was lucky enough to ring 2 quarters one after another neither of which came round but I did get 1hr 30mins of almost continuous practice and I continued on Mobel for longer lengths to know my method inside out. So far, the slight change of technique had kept the blisters away and I felt more confident both in the capability of my hands and my concentration. The peal speed for my method was predicted to be 2:40 so I upped the simulator practice speed to this.

At the beginning of the final week I did one final push on the simulator of 3 hrs! of almost continual ringing, I did have to stop and adjust the computer a few times. My arms no longer ached during this time, I appeared to be able to concentrate with just minor slips in the method and still no blisters, I was quietly confident, I hoped I had not over looked anything, I just told myself it was just an extended practice.

The morning of the peal arrived and I did start to feel nervous. I had sorted out trousers that weren't going to fall down during ringing! I had had adequate food and fluid during the morning and arranged a lift there so I could celebrate in the pub once completed! My mouth was really dry just before I started, nerves I guess.

It was all very relaxed, we tried the ropes for size and started on time, there were a few slips and trips along the way but the conductor put me right almost before I went wrong just awe inspiring! Time passed so quickly, until about 2 hours when I first glanced at the clock, one more look at the clock at 2 and a half hours then it was all done in 2hrs 51m.

I wasn't prepared for the inability to walk immediately after standing the bell, both legs seized to the spot and properly would not walk when I asked them to but that was short lived and just funny! I had prepared well, no aching arms, not too tired, I felt physically able to carry on ringing but my hands were a bit sore, no bleeding on the ropes which no doubt pleased the tower captain of Evesham bell tower.

This is a must do for anyone half considering a peal, its no where near as difficult as I had first imagined, Thankyou to Nick for creating the opportunity for a first peal and to the band members who helped get me through. Alison Lee

# Minutes of a committee meeting held on 8th February 2022 at Wellesbourne

**Apologies for Absence** John Nicholls.

<u>Present</u> Peter Quinn (Chair), Stuart Cummings. Michael Dane, John Wheeler, Jackie Hands, Christina Ireland, Richard Lewis-Skeath, Nick Allsopp. Also in attendance: Alison Lee (Newsletter Editor), Chris Mew (Safeguarding Officer), Chris Povey (V-P). In Steve Bowley's unexpected absence, Chris P took the Minutes.

- 2. Minutes of the last meeting November 9th. Agreed and signed.
- 3. Matters arising from last meeting none
- 4. Reports:

**Guild Master:** Peter said he and Michael had arranged the first Saturday practices at Halford, Honington, S/Priors and Bidford. Honington and Halford had already taken place

Hon. Secretary: the agenda listed 8 prospective members. These were all agreed as follows:-

Matthew Turvey and Tim Watkin (both Childswickham); prop Alison, sec Richard

Martin Robins (Hinton-on-the-Green); prop Alison, sec Christina

Martin Taylor-Reed (Tredington); prop Stuart, sec Chris P

Myra Ford (Bourton-on-the-Water); prop Stuart, sec Chris P

David Jones and Sara Bent (both Elmley Castle/L. Comberton); prop Steve, sec Christina

Christopher Stuart (Great Hampton); prop Chris P, sec John Smith

Hon. Treasurer: Michael had prepared and distributed a report on finances for the last 3 months. The 2021 accounts had been sent to Claire Penny for checking. Michael had also prepared a note about bank charges on the Guild's account. There seems to be no choice at present but to bank and pay everything by BACS to avoid these charges. He said he would keep an eye open for a bank/BS that would charge nothing, but nothing is available. He asked for permission to open an account elsewhere if a better arrangement became available, which was agreed by the Committee. He mentioned that some PCCs wish to have grant money paid by cheque, which incurs a £5 charge. It was agreed that a sentence be added to the offer of grants that PCCs agree to having the money paid by BACS, and confirm that as a condition of accepting the grant (or agree to a £5 reduction to compensate).

Action: Chris P to add the relevant wording.

**Ringing Master:** Richard reported that two of those towers already arranged had had practices. Honington was a slow start, but Halford had a good attendance. The recent Offenham practice had 19.

Safeguarding: Chris M's submissions (circulated with the agenda). The C of E's proposals on this apply to all volunteers in a church, not just ringers, and will be handled in the way each diocese thinks fit. There will be three categories: Basic Awareness (all); Foundation; and Leadership. This could lead to variations in training across boundaries. It could also lead to volunteers deciding not to continue, eg, ringing, if they don't agree with the way the proposals demand. Chris's paper is to form part of the Guild's existing Safeguarding document. As the Guild is not a territorial organisation, Chris's advice is that no immediate action is required by the Guild. It is the territorial bodies that will be affected first – training, etc, likely to be through them to begin with (possibly online for basic).

**Fixture Secretary:** It was decided to stick with one tower per month, and these still to be ground floor rings, or those with balconies. Stuart said he was looking for somebody to take over from him on arranging towers. He has done this for 10 years. Christina said she would give this a try, but would like guidance on how to do this. Towers for May, June and July were required before the May Newsletter was published. **Action:** Christina

**Health and Safety**: Chris M's second paper recommended that the provisions of this – for C of E requirements for Safeguarding and for Covid Awareness – be incorporated into the Guild's H&S document. **Agreed** 

**Newsletter Editor:** if a Guild get-together of some sort is to occur later this year, then adequate notice of it should be given in the Newsletter. For an event in, eg, July, notice should be in the May Newsletter. The advert for Guild badges will appear again. The subscription rate for posted Newsletters should be increased to £5, due to increased postal charges. **Agreed.** 

Website: Nothing from Roland

Mid-week Tours: have restarted and Michael reported that £100 had come from this group.

CCCBR: nothing of note, except payment of affiliation fee

**Peal Secretary:** no report, but there are some peals to be written up now. The peal book is with Chris P, who will get it to Sandra for the updating. **Action**: Chris

- **5. Bells repair fund:** The Didbrook grant is likely to be paid soon, as work is underway. Rededication date is 8th May. When this is paid the Fund will have £4957 of unallocated funds. Chris will inspect the work
- **6. Learning to ring flyer:** Alison reported some towers are asking for more flyers, but she still has many available. She asked if she could simplify the flyer into an A5 format for putting on notice boards. **Agreed** 
  - 7. Assessment of current membership: a decision was made to update the membership list in 2022 when a better idea

- **8. Resumption of Guild activities update:** This was mostly covered in discussions earlier, but adequate notice of whatever is agreed should occur. A pig roast was suggested, with The Fleece at Bretforton being a possible venue. Richard would investigate.
- **9. AOB:** Chris alerted the Committee to an important date next year: 30<sup>th</sup> March 2023, the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of a preliminary meeting to gauge interest in re-founding the Guild. This took place in the Church Rooms, Chipping Campden. A proposal to re-found the Guild was made, seconded and agreed. The rest is history. It was agreed we should mark this occasion in decent style. It is believed there are now only four people who were there at the original meeting. It was suggested the Annual Dinner could be delayed until then; and possibly a peal at Chipping Campden. It was suggested a special badge might be produced, to include '50'.

Secondly, the Listed Place of Worship Grant Scheme (the governmental scheme that allows VAT refunds of certain aspects of bell, and other, work in a listed church) is to continue until March 2025. It is a good time to undertake bell work soon, as after that date VAT refunds may not occur (and this includes the refund of VAT on bell ropes).

10. Date and location of the next meeting: Tuesday 10th May 2022, Church House, Evesham: 7.00pm

# Learning Methods

# By Neil Garner

This time we are going back to first principles and one of the earliest methods known to our art..... Grandsire.

As many of my friends will know... I have a unique view of Grandsire and believe it is something of an anomaly and should be treated as an advanced method.

Let me explain why....

# History

Grandsire is one of the oldest methods we have and its history can be traced back into the 17th century. The book *Tintinnalogia* was written by Robert Roan (published by Fabian Stedman in 1667) and introduced the idea of method ringing for the first time to a mass audience. Grandsire was the 'big thing' in that book and it has remained a favourite with many towers ever since.

Plain Bob Minimus (originally called Doubles and Singles) and Plain Bob Minor (originally called Grandsire Bob) also appeared in the same book... but although they date from a similar time, once you get away from the basic idea of plain hunting (used by all three), the similarities end.

# What makes Grandsire special...

# PB Minimus Grandsire Doubles




Unlike the vast majority of methods commonly rung, Grandsire has two hunt bells... so both the treble and 2nd place bell do not partake in the substance of the method, remaining as a reference for the 'working' bells. There could be as many double hunt methods like Grandsire as there are more standard ones like Plain Bob, but very few of these have ever been developed, rung or named and the majority of those that have are doubles methods, rung by peal bands 'pushing the envelope' and looking for ever more extraordinary variation for their performances.

At a first glance, Grandsire Doubles looks like a simple extension of Plain Bob Minimus. In Plain Bob, simple plain hunt is extended by adjusting the very last change. This is done by keeping the bell in second place static and thus stopping things coming round. This also causes all the bells above seconds to reverse for one change (a dodge) as their path is blocked.

By adding another hunt bell, the whole process has to move one place further out... so thirds place bell remains static, with the above bells reversing (dodging) for one change in 4-5.

At face value, both methods can then be extended out to any number of bells by adding more pairs that dodge in 5-6, 7-8, etc. (Plain Bob) or 6-7, 8-9, etc. (Grandsire). However, beyond this the logic becomes fuzzy...

# Where is the lead end ...?



In Plain Bob (and almost any other standard method for that matter) the lead end is when the extension change is applied, as well as being when the treble leads. It means that in Plain Bob, we all plain hunt until the treble leads and then we dodge or make a place for the very last change... This stops it coming round and extends it to 'n' leads... where 'n' is the number of working bells. This also works for Grandsire, but it creates a problem...

In Grandsire the second hunt bell does not lead until after the treble... so the mid point (at which we want to make our adjustment) now moves too... from lead end to lead head... so Grandsire has a lead end which is where it starts and finishes... and a different point where the adjustment to extend takes place, one change later and therefore into the next lead! Work that back and the result is that the working bells start with a dodge or place before any other

Plain Bob Symmetry is at the lead and half lead

Grandsire symmetry is offset by 1 change


changes are rung and the symmetry of the line is no longer co-incident with the lead end and half lead points...

In terms of ringing a simple plain course of Grandsire, these issues are relatively trivial and most ringers can just accept it is 'different', i.e. 'Grandsire starts'.... However, it does mean that unlike most methods, the line is asymmetric, so you cannot define it with a normal half lead of place notation!

# A Bigger Anomaly...

Anyone who has started calling, or even more importantly, conducting Grandsire (there is a big difference) will know that it is very different from almost all other methods... the calls are different, the placing of calls is different and the effects are different.... so all in all, a very different experience!

# Plain Hunt & Plain Bob Minor Lead-Ends



Let's look a little more closely....

In Plain Hunt we alternate between switching all bells and keeping the 1st and 6th static... which is why we lead and lie for a whole pull...

Plain Bob is similar, except we keep 1 and 2 static for the lead-end change, creating 3 consecutive even bell swaps for higher places - a dodge. (Technically, anything below the static bell continues to plain hunt and all above have to dodge.)

At a Bob or Single (also used in most other methods), we will see that it is once again a simple adjustment which occurs only on

the lead end change. As a result, the method will be extended in a different way and thus create more changes.

A Bob will keep the 4th bell static instead of the 2nd. This means that just like a plain lead end... bells below will hunt (i.e. the 1st, 2nd & 3rd) and those above will dodge. The result is that bells in 2nd, 3rd, 4ths place do not follow a normal plain lead... and are thus switched in the order. The logic is simple, easy to apply and works for any number of bells and for countless other methods too!


A single is slightly different in that 1,2,3 & 4 all make a place. Compared to a plain lead, we see seconds place bell is unaffected, so only **one** pair (3rd & 4th place bells) swap places... hence the term 'single'.

# Grandsire Lead -Ends

In Grandsire, it is much more complicated due to the asymmetry and the way in which our ancestors chose to deal with it...


The first issue is that Grandsire does not actually have 2 hunt bells... it has one hunt bell (the treble) and one variable hunt bell (which can be any of the others). So when a Bob or Single is called, the variable hunt bell will change. The second issue is how the Bobs and Singles are applied...

# Plain Lead-Ends



As we have already seen, Grandsire is asymmetric because the point at which the extending change is added (red loop) is not at the lead end.


# **Bob Lead-Ends**



When a Bob is called, it happens earlier than in normal methods... also it does not change the plain lead adjustment (red loop), but adds a balancing change before the lead end (green loop)... So thirds are now made one change before and again one change after the lead end. This 'double' blockage means that bells above thirds have to reverse direction twice and this is what creates the double dodge.... So, one dodge for the Bob adjustment and another two changes later for the plain lead....

Interestingly, this now makes Grandsire symmetrical... if only momentarily!

# Single Lead- Ends



The single is more complex still... It too makes the method temporarily symmetrical but adds a third extension change... this time at the lead end itself. It means that a single includes the extension change for the Bob (green loop), another for the Plain lead (red loop) and in-between a third adjustment change (blue loop) for the Single!

It also raises some questions too ...

- Why is it called a single when every working bell is affected? ...Possibly because
  that extra change in the middle does swap one pair... but that is quietly ignoring all
  the other changes which occur on the previous change!
- The variable hunt bell ceases when it starts to double dodge, but the new variable
  hunt bell does not appear until the lead-end... so which bell is the variable hunt in
  between? ... Theoretically, it must be the bell making long thirds... for just part of the
  block of 4 changes! However, in reality, it probably doesn't matter...

# The Practicalities...

For any aspiring conductor, these issues add complexities...

- At a Bob, all bells except for 3rds place are affected and at a single all bells are affected and jump to a
  different place bell... meaning more transposition work to track the progress of a composition and more
  difficulty working out what people are/were/will be doing...
- · Calls need to be one blow earlier than for standard methods.
- Because of the extended duration of the calls, they seem to be closer together especially for doubles... and with nearly everything changing after every call, working out where you are can be also be tricky!

At this point, I'm really not doing a very good job of selling Grandsire... and rest my case for it being an advanced method - but perhaps we need to remember where it all started...

Grandsire dates from the earliest days of our art and it is likely that those who invented it did not think things through and had no benefit of hindsight... it just grew organically from what they liked and what worked.... and that is probably the most important point. For all its illogicality and eccentricity, it has an amazing ability to produce interesting changes and sound good - which probably explains why we still ring it so often... quirks and all!

It is a method that you can safely say would not be invented today and if it were, it would almost certainly lie in obscurity....

Ringing Grandsire is clearly not too difficult as so many manage to do it and for some it will be their first foray into method ringing... but understanding it is another matter and as we have just seen... it is fairly unique! In practice, those that ring and conduct Grandsire at a high level have special techniques to manage it... be it conducting, composition or just ringing it well.... and will accept that the effort involved is worth it because it makes good music. They are genuine specialists!

Interestingly, there is a method called St Augustine's which has a plain course based on a sequence of Grandsire singles... It has no second hunt bell, has normal half-lead/lead end symmetry, is easy to learn, manage, conduct and compose for and uses standard bobs. It is much more logical/sensible... but will not have the same flexibility to extract our favourite changes on higher numbers, because it is less complex....

...and of course it has no pedigree, so it is almost unknown!

The time limit on raising and falling was discussed but no action be taken until the rule is abused.

3 Newsletter

MFF offered to photocopy typed sheets if paper was provided. AT offered paper at £1.90 per ream. To save paper both sides should be printed.

4 Competition

Teams expected were Mickleton, Ebrington, Shipston/Tredington with possibly Offenham and Campden. There would probably be no Service.

Pardon ( and during the latter part of the meeting) The Rev Spencer Jones.

After the minutes had been duly read and passed, letters of apology for non attendance were read from the Rev's G. E. Hitchcock and a. D. Agar, also from Mr E. Harris (Willersey).

It was decided that the competitions be carried out on similar lines as at the previous meeting at Moreton, commencing at 2 pm sharp.
